In The News

As we learn of more and more ways that we are being tracked, the ubiquitous cell phone remains the best way to know not only where we are, but also can indicate most everything we do:

"MAC addresses ... [leave] a never-ending series of digital footprints that revealed a dizzying array of information about our comings and goings, including what time we left the bar last night, how many times we were there in the past month, the time we leave for work each day, and the route we take to get there."

Randomizing the MAC address used to check for wifi connections is supposed to provide some level of privacy but it turns out that "Android phones that ... provide randomization suffered from flaws that largely rendered the protection meaningless." As the article notes, this is yet another reason why people should "turn off their devices when they don't want to leak information."
